What do they mean in practice?

A half-day course

The Scottish Information Commissioner has issued over 650 decision notices under the Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act and the Environmental Information (Scotland) Regulations. These often complex decisions are essential materials for anyone trying to understand what Scottish public authorities must do to comply with the legislation. This course, aimed at those with a good working knowledge of the legislation, highlights key developments in the way the main exemptions, the public interest test and the legislation's procedural requirements are being interpreted.

About the trainer

The course will be presented by the Campaign's director, **Maurice Frankel**, who has worked in the field for 23 years. He was actively involved in campaigning for FOI and seeking improvements to the legislation in the UK and Scottish parliaments. He now trains public authority staff and requesters in the legislation. He is a member of the Ministry of Justice Information Rights User Group and was formerly a member of the Lord Chancellor's Advisory Group on Implementation of the FOI Act. He was a member of the Commonwealth Group of Experts whose FOI Principles were adopted by Commonwealth Law Ministers in 1999. He drafted the successful private members' bills which became the Access to Personal Files Act 1987, the Access to Medical Reports Act 1988, the Environment and Safety Information Act 1988 and the Access to Health Records Act 1990.

The course will cover key decisions under the Scottish FOI Act and EIRs, including those that:

- Set precedents for future cases
- Require public authorities to change the way they respond to requests
- Illustrate good practice
- Indicate how the law is evolving
- Clarify the circumstances in which particular exemptions apply
- Reveal when the public interest test favours disclosure or confidentiality
- Identify those UK Information Tribunal decisions whose approach has been adopted by the Scottish Information Commissioner
